**HOROWITZ FOUNDATION SELECTS 11 SCHOLARS AS RECIPIENTS  
OF GRANTS FOR RESEARCH IN SOCIAL POLICY**

The Horowitz Foundation for Social Policy has selected eleven scholars to receive research grants in the social sciences. A list of recipients of year 2005 grants, their institutions, and their projects is attached. The Foundation has set a deadline of January 31, 2007 for receipt of applications and all supporting materials for 2006 awards, which will be announced in June 2007.

Established in 1998, the Horowitz Foundation generally approves grants in amounts ranging from \$3,000-\$5,000 per grant. The number of awards this year reflects an unusually large number of quality applications. Research grants are open to scholars in all social science disciplines for projects that deal with contemporary issues in the social sciences. Preference is given to projects that deal with contemporary issues in the social sciences or issues of significant policy relevance. Preference is given to scholars in the early stages of their professional careers, and in particular, those completing research for a professional degree in their chosen field. Applicants need not be citizens of the United States, and grants are not restricted to U.S. residents.

Commenting on the awards for 2005, the Foundation's chairman, Irving Louis noted: "Our decision this year was not easy. We had the largest number of applicants since the Foundation's inception, and almost all met the criteria established for consideration. We were impressed by the quality of the projects presented, which reflects well on the quality of research programs at major institutes of higher learning. The projects selected all deal with important policy issues, reflect awareness of current research on the subject, and use methodology appropriate to the topic."
